

Tennessee Lands Unsuitable for Mining

The State of Tennessee has petitioned the U.S. Office of Surface Mining Regulation and Enforcement (OSMRE) to designate as "unsuitable for mining" over 67,000 acres of state-designated conservation lands in northeastern Tennessee. The proposal would provide a variety of conservation benefits, including improved water quality and protection of riparian habitats in two NPS-managed parks that lie downstream of the petition area. Say "No" to Pipelines-Through-Parks Legislation

Current law requires specific Congressional approval before an oil or gas pipeline can be built through any unit of the National Park System. However, a proposed amendment to an energy bill being considered in the U.S. Senate would eliminate this requirement and promote the construction of natural gas pipelines through parks. The Coalition and other conservation groups strongly oppose the pipelines-through-parks amendment.


