COVID-19 Impacts

We submitted yet another FOIA request asking for the number of COVID-19 cases to date among NPS employees and the parks in which they work. To date, none of the requests from the past year have been answered.

The Coalition also issued a statement on NPS employees and the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, urging the NPS to prioritize the health and safety of frontline NPS employees through PPE, training, and vaccinations. The statement aligns with the priorities we sent to the Biden Transition Team for their first 100 days in office.

Positive News for LWCF Funds

The Coalition issued a statement of support after President Biden's Department of the Interior repealed former Secretary of the Interior Bernhardt's Secretarial Orders on the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) which imposed unnecessary, topdown requirements that delayed the National Park Service's ability to address its over \$5 billion backlog of land acquisition needs.

The Coalition submitted <u>extensive</u>

Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the Transmission Line Project across the James River. In addition, we reached out Virginia's <u>State Historic Preservation</u>

<u>Office</u>, the <u>NPS</u>, and the <u>Advisory Council on Historic Preservation</u> regarding our concerns.

The Protection Ranger Profession

The Coalition in partnership with the Association of National Park Rangers (ANPR), has been a vocal advocate for the protection of the Protection Ranger profession. In January, NPS issued a memo to the field, stating that after careful review, no NPS 0025 positions would be converted to the 1801 series. What We're Reading & Tracking This Month

A recent investigation by National
Geograhic found that, "the Trump
Administration's push to open public lands
for energy exploration puts Carlsbad
Caverns, scores of other caves in New
Mexico, and aquifers that supply drinking
water to tens of thousands of homeowners at
risk of contamination." The Coalition
recently celebrated President Biden's halt to
new oil and gas drilling on public lands and
waters, as a postive step forward in
protecting our parks and public lands.

The National Park Service kicked off Black History Month with <u>a list</u> of ten ways to commemorate the month in our national parks. But there are scores of other sites where you can learn more about the stories and accomplishments of Black Americans - and perhaps they'll be part of the National Park System someday too. Take, for example, the town of New Philadelphia, founded by Free Frank McWorter, the first Black person to legally plan a community in America. The Memorial Field for Black Lives received an award for "Excellence in Historic Site Interpretation and Public Engagement." The exhibit is at the John Brown Farm State Historic Site in North Elba, NY, the home and final resting place of the 19th century abolitionist who gave his life to end slavery.
