Coalition News

With a government shutdown looming, the Coalition worked hard during September to communicate the negative impacts a government shutdown has on our parks and public lands. We hosted a virtual discussion about the impacts of a government shutdown and the outlook for FY 2024 appropriations, and we issued a press <u>release</u> condemning the impending shutdown and urging Congress to pass a continuing resolution.

Our work is far from complete. Congress now has approximately 45 days to complete their appropriations work or we will once again face the prospect of a shutdown. We are deeply concerned about FY 2024 funding levels and we will continue to advocate for our national parks and public lands.

Advocacy Actions

Below are highlights from the Coalition's actions in September:

- · The Coalition submitted detailed comments to BLM on its proposed Fluid Mineral Leases and Leasing Process rule. The comments include support for the intent of the rule and make numerous recommendations for improving the proposal. Additionally, the Coalition joined more than 20 organizations in submitting extensive comments on the proposed rule.
- The Coalition continues to pursue increased protections for public lands. We issued statements of support, urging the administration to designate the **Chuckwalla National** Monument, adjacent to Joshua Tree National Park, and calling for the expansion of **Berryessa Snow Mountain** National Monument to include Molok Luyuk.
- The Coalition submitted comments in support of the proposed visitor management plan for Yosemite National Park. We also submitted comments on visitor use management at Glacier National Park following our op-ed about visitor management and the need for additional appropriations to help Glacier and other national parks address overcrowding and understaffing.
- · Coalition Chair Mike Murray authored an op-ed about the continuing threat of climate change and why we must take action now.

September was a busy month, and these are just some of our advocacy actions. Please visit our website for all of our actions and press coverage. Don't forget to check out the blog for a new post on overcrowding and the need for additional operational funding at parks.
